An update on the national evaluation of the New Deal for Communities programme

## Welcome!

It has been a busy year for the National Evaluation Team. Ipsos MORI conducted its third, 2006, Household Survey, interviewing almost 16,000 people in the 39 NDC areas. Work is well underway in the six NDC case study areas. SDRC has continued to source key administrative statistics, which it has provided to NDCs in regular data 'bundles'. And the Evaluation Team has held a number of learning and dissemination events, providing opportunities for Partnerships, Government and others to learn important lessons from the NDC Programme. All of this work is helping to provide insights into why and how changes occur at the local level and to answer the core questions of the evaluation:

- Has the NDC Programme been successful?
- What is the added value of the NDC community based partnership approach to neighbourhood renewal?
- What is the most effective way to plan for neighbourhood renewal over 10 years?

## Evaluation update

The period up to April 2008 will see the Evaluation Team continuing to pursue a number of key themes including (but not limited to):

**Community engagement and involvement:** this strand will explore how and why communities are being engaged and involved in local activities and to what ends. What can realistically be achieved in terms of levels of involvement and how does this impact on delivery and outcomes? The evaluation will also focus on NDC elections – what can we learn from the Programme in relation to wider discussions on democratic renewal?

**Population turnover:** high rates of population turnover, or churn, have been identified in a number of NDC areas. This can pose challenges for NDCs and service providers. Work will be undertaken primarily in the six case study NDCs to explore how churn impacts on service delivery.

**The cost-benefit balance:** a strand of activity is being carried out across the Programme looking at impact and value for money. This work will focus on spend across different types of activities and leverage of match funding. Critically this work will also help assess the effectiveness of the Programme as a whole from a cost-benefit perspective. Findings will be important in making the case for 'selling' NDC approaches locally.

Other themes include **succession planning, community ownership of assets, and youth involvement.** All of these will be explored through a range of outputs, including Programme Wide data analysis and policy reports, case studies and practice reviews. Work will also continue on the collection and analysis of administrative data, preparation for the Ipsos MORI 2008 Household Survey, and the holding of learning and dissemination events.

## REMINDER!!! The Ipsos MORI Extranet is online

The NDC extranet site is now online, giving NDC Partnerships access to a rich source of data from the 2002, 2004 and 2006 Household Surveys. The site allows you to download and manipulate data and documents relating to all three

surveys, including SPSS data and research design notes. The Extranet enables visitors to carry out on-line analysis of survey results, thus enabling Partnerships to draw out findings on particular themes and to compare results with those for other NDCs.

## NDC administrative data

The Social Disadvantage Research Centre (SDRC) at the University of Oxford continues to collate and analyse administrative data. This data is of considerable value to individual Partnerships in that indicators for each NDC area, parent local authorities, Government Offices for the Regions, and England are released as data bundles, as far as possible, on a quarterly basis.

Partnerships should note that the end of July release has had to be postponed until the end of August. Subject to data suppliers delivering on time, the next release will contain 2006 worklessness counts, 05/06 rates of entry into higher education, and 2006 house prices.

## Learning and Dissemination

As part of its commitment to delivering shared learning, the evaluation consortium has been coordinating a range of learning and dissemination events aimed at NDCs, their local partners, government departments, and others. Learning and dissemination events provide opportunities to interrogate and synthesise findings from the Programme. Two events have been held recently.

First, an afternoon seminar on Community Engagement brought together researchers from the Evaluation Team with other academics in the field, to focus on the core issue of community involvement in regeneration. Participants debated differences that community involvement had made to the NDC Programme, looking at when and how resident engagement added most value and the implications this held for sustaining regeneration into the future.

Second, an event was held at Coventry NDC looking at masterplanning in NDC areas. Like a number of other Partnerships, Coventry has embarked on a major programme of renewal which will transform the housing and physical infrastructure of the local area in the coming years. This event provided a valuable opportunity for NDCs to learn from Coventry's approach to working with partners, developers and local communities. The visit also highlighted lessons from across the NDC Programme, drawing on the upcoming Practice Study on Masterplanning.
